One of my favorite Christmas stories is Charles Dickens, "A Christmas Carol." Since I was a young child, I have always been fascinated by the mean Mr. Scrooge who on one fateful Christmas Eve is visited by four ghosts, who each do their part to change the heart of a stubborn uncaring person. It is such a wonderful story, that it has been retold numerous times on stage and screen. Yet, none seem to compare to the 1951 version starring Alastair Sim. There was a time in my life where it just was not Christmas unless I had watched this version of the story. I can remember one year, long before on demand, cable and dvd's, when I woke up at five o'clock in the morning to watch it, since it was the only time it was being shown that year. I always found the second ghost, the ghost of Christmas past to be the most interesting, because he shows Mr. Scrooge the man he was before his heart was hardened.

We all have memories of Christmas past. Our memories of past events are important. Such memories guide us in our daily lives and help us to plan our futures. They also may give us a safe place to retreat when facing difficult times. For some the memories may not be the best, maybe a loved one died during a previous holiday season, or a relationship fell apart. But for most of us, we focus on the warmer memories. I can still remember many of the gifts I received over the years (even as far back as the early sixties). I can remember various Christmas meals of the family gathered together. I can remember some of the fun things we did. I can remember the year the Christmas tree fell over, or the year our cat was missing only to be found asleep nestled in the branches of the Christmas tree.

Each year as I prepare for Christmas both in the church and at home I am flooded with various memories of Christmas past. Whether it be picking out a tree, decorating the church, wrapping gifts, decorating the tree, or downloading a Christmas music playlist to my iPhone.

Memory is also an important part of our faith. Remembering God and being remembered by God is essential. Jesus knew this and used it in instituting his last supper, for we are instructed to receive his body and blood in remembrance of him. The thief on the cross knew this as well for his dying words to Jesus were, "Jesus, remember me, when you come into your kingdom." How important this realization is. For we are reminded that Jesus' kingdom is not of this world. Jesus was not born to be a king of this world, for it is in his death and resurrection that he becomes king and enters his throne room.

As we go about this season of preparation, let us always be mindful that we remember what God has done for us, not so much through the child of Bethlehem, but through his son who was willing to die for us so that we might live with him in his true kingdom, in paradise


Finance Committee - 2020 Budget Summary

The Trinity Church budget for 2020 was approved at our annual congregation meeting in November. Here are some highlights of the budget and our financial state.

This chart is a comparative Income and Expense trend since 2015, with 2019 projected forecast and 2020 budget. The chart plots Total Income, which is the lower line on the chart, against Total Expense, which is higher than income. The gap between is Net Income, or the difference between the two, which is showing as a deficit each year B. We are forecasting to narrow that deficit gap in 2020. Net

Income for the end of 2019 is expected to be within 12% of budget, and we expect a negative deficit of (\$46,670) at the end of 2019.

We are budgeting 2020 Net Income to improve by %70 to a deficit of (\$14,350). © This comes from expected expenses to stay about the same compared to previous years, and for expected total income to increase from anticipated investment income, which is thanks mostly to a bequest, plus a trending increase in offerings.



To put that deficit of (\$14,350) in perspective, we could get it to zero *if offerings increased on average* by \$3 per week per envelope.

- Projected 2019 Building Income and Expense are higher than other years. This is from the fund-raising for the carpet. The Income and Expense offset each other from the \$21,000 raised and spent on the carpet.
- Projected 2019 Operating Income is trending lower this year, but the money donated for the carpet offsets this in Total Income. The 2020 Budget for operating income is increased to maintain the total income trend.
- > The forecasted 2020 Budget for Building and Operating Expense is decreased by 9% and 3% respectively to be in line with savings seen in the 2019 actual and projected totals.
- > Outreach and Memorial Budget is maintained the same for 2020 at \$7,000 and \$3,000 respectively, and Payroll is increasing 4% between 2019 and 2020 budgets.

Expenses would be much higher if it wasn't for all the folks that serve by volunteering their time and skills in so many ways. We are truly blessed with an active congregation. That helps on both sides of the budget equation, not only saving money, but also making our church a place where people want to come to worship and serve.



Make some Christmas candles to remember Jesus, the Light of the world.




What you need:
