

From the Pastor's Desk

On Sunday, February 16, we sang two hymns that included the word "transport". Every time we sing these hymns, I am always struck by the use of the word "transport", since I know that it is not being used in the usual way. Being someone who is often fascinated by words, their use and origin, I finally had to look this one up.

First let us consider those two hymn verses. The first came from the hymn, *The King of love my Shepherd is.* Verse #5

Thou spread'st a table in my sight, Thy unction grace bestoweth; And O what <u>transport</u> and delight From thy pure chalice floweth!

The second is from the hymn To God be the glory-great things He has done! Verse #3

Great things He hath taught us, Great things He hath done, And great our rejoicing Thru Jesus the Son; But purer and higher and greater will be Our wonder, our <u>transport</u> when Jesus we see.

It is obvious in these two verses that the word transport is not being used in the sense of moving people or things from one place to another which would be the first definition entry of the word. However, there is a secondary definition to the word transport that we are less familiar with today and that is the definition used here. That definition is, "to carry away with strong and often intensely pleasant emotion." What is being moved here is our emotions. In the first verse, we are being moved by Jesus' sacrificial blood poured out for us. In the second, we are moved when we finally see Jesus in the heavenly realm.

As we approach the season of Lent, I am reminded that it is a season which does move us emotionally. On Ash Wednesday, we are moved by the reminder that we "are dust, and to dust we shall return". We are moved on the first Sunday of Lent, when Jesus spends forty days fasting in the desert and is tempted by Satan. We are moved when Jesus raises Lazarus from the dead on the fifth Sunday of Lent. We are moved as we walk the way of the cross on Wednesday of Holy Week. We are moved when Jesus prays in the Garden of Gethsemane and is betrayed on Maundy Thursday. We are moved at the Good Friday Tenebrae service when we sit in darkness and hear the loud bang of Jesus' tomb being sealed. Finally, we are moved when Mary Magdalene finds the empty tomb on Easter Sunday and is the first witness to the gospel proclaiming the risen Lord.

Let us 'move' together in this season as we journey to the cross and beyond with Jesus, rekindling our faith as we relive the great mysteries of Lent, Easter and God's love for us conveyed through the life, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ our Lord.




Use your voice and this hand-crafted percussion instrument to make joyful noises to the Lord.

What you need:

- Dry beans (about one Tbsp)
- Plastic Easter egg
- · 2 plastic spoons
- Masking tape
- Markers and stickers

What you do:

- 1. Place the beans inside the egg and snap it closed.
- 2. Set the egg in a spoon and cover it with the second spoon so the spoons are holding the egg.
- 3. Tape the spoons to the egg. Also wrap tape around the spoons from top to bottom to make a shaker handle.
- 4. Decorate your shaker and use it as you sing praises to God.
- 5. Experiment with sounds by filling other eggs with coins, rice, and so on.

Below are some of the projects we accomplished:

- Since some of our doors did not pass fire inspection (they did not self-close) one door

We had our carpet contractor install white cove molding on the base of the wood which left the top cap still exposed a dark brown. - There was general cleaning and decluttering.
- The glass globes for the candle holders from Christmas Eve services were dewaxed and stored away.
- The refrigerator from the food pantry was moved back to the pantry from our kitchen. We now have a brand new beautiful commercial refrigerator. If you have not seen it, please go take a look. It was paid in full by our Memorial Light Fund.

Our next work will be March 7th starting at 8 a.m. Some of our to do list includes:

- Inspections and maintenance
- Paint prep and painting
- Continued decluttering and cleaning
- Some electrical work
- Toilet repair and plumbing
